1. Purchase Item Agreements over \$50,000

1.1 Academic Affairs

1.1.1 Airplanes, Aviation Fuel, & Liability Insurance

Authorization was requested renew an agreement with Christiansen Aviation, Inc (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$576,575** to lease airplanes and purchase aviation fuel and liability insurance for the aviation program, as a sole source purchase. The amount requested is unchanged from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.1.2 Data Processing Equipment

Authorization was requested to enter an agreement with Connection, Inc. (Schaumburg, IL) in the amount of **\$308,116** to provide data processing equipment for classroom use. The purchase will be made under NCPA contract 01-44. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.1.3 Testing Services

Authorization was requested to enter an agreement with the Kaplan Early Learning Company (Lewisville, NC) in the amount of **\$80,510** to provide standardized testing services for students. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.1.4 Software Services

Authorization was requested to enter a sponsorship agreement with the Tulsa Regional STEM Alliance (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$78,000**. The sponsorship will be funded from general budget.

1.1.5 Software Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Digital Architecture (Lakeland, FL) in the amount of **\$75,000** to provide curriculum management software services. The amount requested is an increase of \$9,049 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.1.6 Software Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with ProQuest, LLC (Ann Arbor, MI) in the amount of **\$70,000** to provide library research software services. The amount requested is an increase of \$5,000 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with OCLC (Dublin, OH) in the amount of **\$63,000** to provide library research software services. The amount requested is an increase of \$3,000 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

GH2 Architects LLC (Tulsa, OK) and Key Construction LLC (Tulsa, OK) were previously selected for the design and construction management of the Student Success Center projects. Key has selected subcontractors for the project on the basis of competitive bidding. The remaining portions of the project will be competitively bid a later date as needed. The project will be funded from capital budget.

1.2.2 Custodial Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with ABM Industry Groups, LLC (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$2,203,490** to provide custodial services for all campuses under RFP-16003-TL. The amount requested represents a decrease of \$176,298 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.3 Software Maintenance

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Ellucian Company, LP (Chicago, IL) in the amount of **\$484,150** to provide data processing software maintenance for the College ERP system. The amount requested is an increase of \$20,192 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.4 Property Insurance

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with the State of Oklahoma Office of Management & Enterprise Services (OMES), DCAM Risk Management Department (Oklahoma City, OK) in the amount of **\$438,437** to provide property insurance coverage. The amount requested is an increase of \$128,685 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.5 Software Maintenance

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Oracle America, Inc. (Redwood Shores, CA) in the amount of **\$361,918** to provide data processing software maintenance related to the College's ERP system. The amount requested is an increase of \$13,920 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.6 Liability Management Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with College Association of Liability Management (CALM) (Oklahoma City, OK) in the amount of **\$356,379** to provide liability management services for the College. The amount requested is an increase of \$6,379 from the previous year. The purchase is in participation with the Board of Regents of Oklahoma Colleges. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.7 Print Management Services

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with ImageNet Consulting, LLC (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$320,000** to provide print management services for all campuses under Oklahoma State University contract. The amount requested is unchanged from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.8 Data Processing Network & Phone Service

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Cox Business Services, LLC (Oklahoma City, OK) in the amount of **\$298,764** to purchase data processing network and phone services for all campuses. The amount requested is a decrease of \$6,236 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.9 Software Maintenance

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Blackboard, Inc. (Washington, D.C.) in the amount of **\$287,756** to provide data processing software maintenance. The amount requested is an increase of \$6,723 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.10 Data Processing Software

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Connection, Inc. (Schaumburg, IL) in the amount of **\$222,751** to provide Microsoft product licensing for the College. The amount requested is an increase of \$817 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.11 Grounds Maintenance

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Landmark Service Group (Broken Arrow, OK) in the amount of **\$189,254** to provide grounds maintenance services for all campuses under RFP-21005-BC. The amount requested is an increase of \$65,254 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement the Center for Employment Opportunities (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$131,250** to provide temporary labor services for all campuses. The amount requested is unchanged from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.⁸

The amount requested in an increase of \$3,996 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from General budget.

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with ThyssenKrupp Elevator (Atlanta, GA) in the amount of **\$75,000** to provide elevator maintenance services under RFP-16005-TL. The amount requested is a decrease of \$10,911. from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.19 Fertilization and Weed Control

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Lawn America (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$66,049** to provide fertilization and weed control services under RFP-21005-BC. The amount requested is a decrease of \$12,701 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.20 Cyber Insurance

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with the State of Oklahoma Office of Management & Enterprise Services (OMES), DCAM Risk Management Department (Oklahoma City, OK) in the amount of **\$65,000** to provide cyber insurance coverage. The amount requested is an increase of \$49,000 from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.21 Software Licensing

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with CDW, LLC (Vernon Hills, IL) in the amount of **\$60,549** to provide Adobe licensing. The agreement was negotiated by Oklahoma State University on behalf of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE). The requested amount is unchanged from the previous year and represents the College's share of the total contract amount. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.22 Software Licensing

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with TMA Systems, LLC (Tulsa, OK) in the amount of **\$56,700** to provide maintenance management software. The amount requested is unchanged from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from general budget.

1.2.23 Software Licensing

Authorization was requested to renew an agreement with Ellucian Company LP (Fairfax, VA) in the amount of **\$56,250** to provide continuing education CRM software services. The amount requested is unchanged from the previous year. The purchase will be funded from auxiliary budget.

We also received praise in a Tulsa World editorial for our efforts and collaboration to address Tulsa's lack of college-educated talent.

Celebrating Dual Credit Graduates

TCC celebrated 54 high school seniors earning an associate degree through TCC's dual credit programs from six different districts in the Tulsa-metro area -- Union, Broken Arrow, Kiefer, Dove, Glenpool, Homeschool. The number of dual credit graduates is growing exponentially from three in 2019, 11 in 2020 to 54 dual credit graduates this year.

First Cohort of EDGE Graduates from Union High School

One of the dual credit programs is EDGE: Earn a Degree, Graduate Early. This May members of the very first cohort launched back in 2017 graduated high school and earned an associate degree at no cost to the family. The pilot program, launched in partnership with Union Public Schools, has now been expanded to Tulsa Public School's Memorial and McLain High Schools and Broken Arrow High School. EDGE is designed to reach students who qualify for Oklahoma's Promise based on income guidelines, and a secondary focus of achieving 80 percent first-generation college students.

Signature Symphony Holds Concert and Overture Outdoors Fundraisers

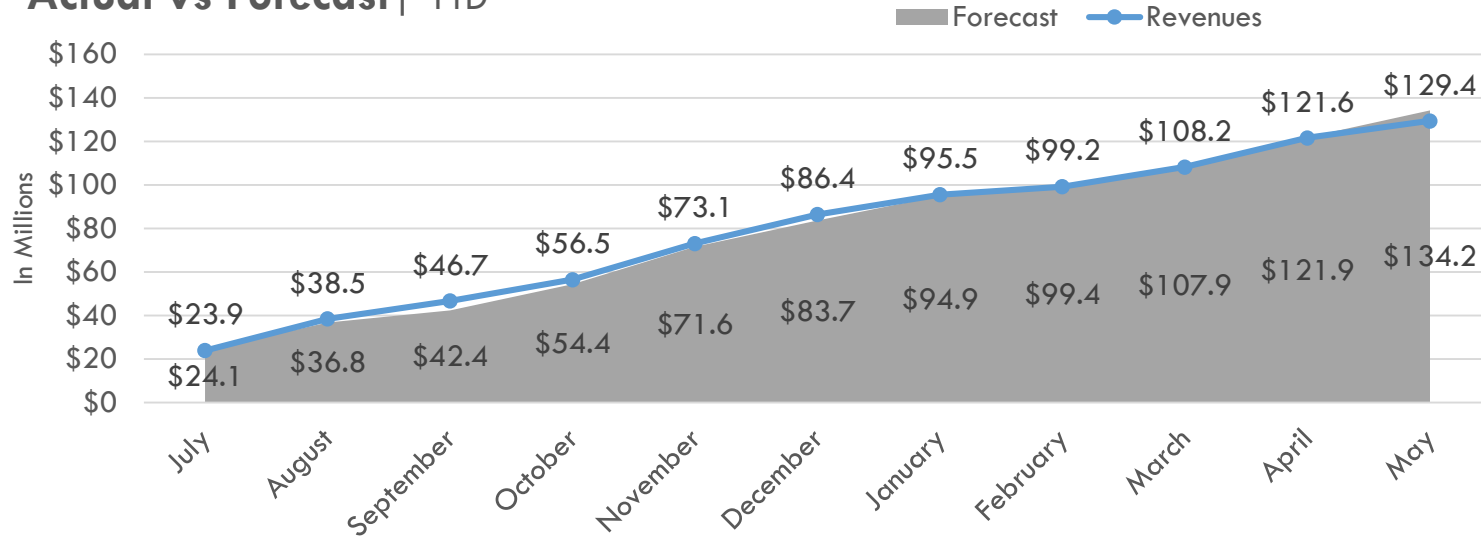

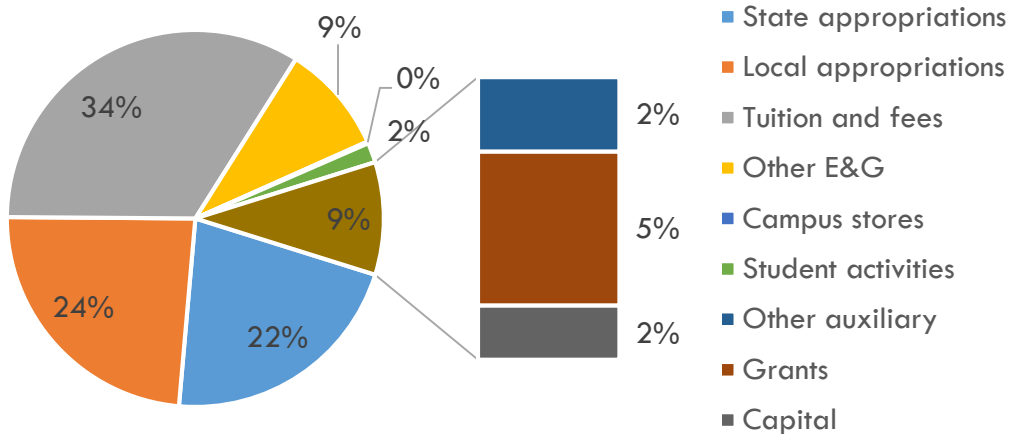

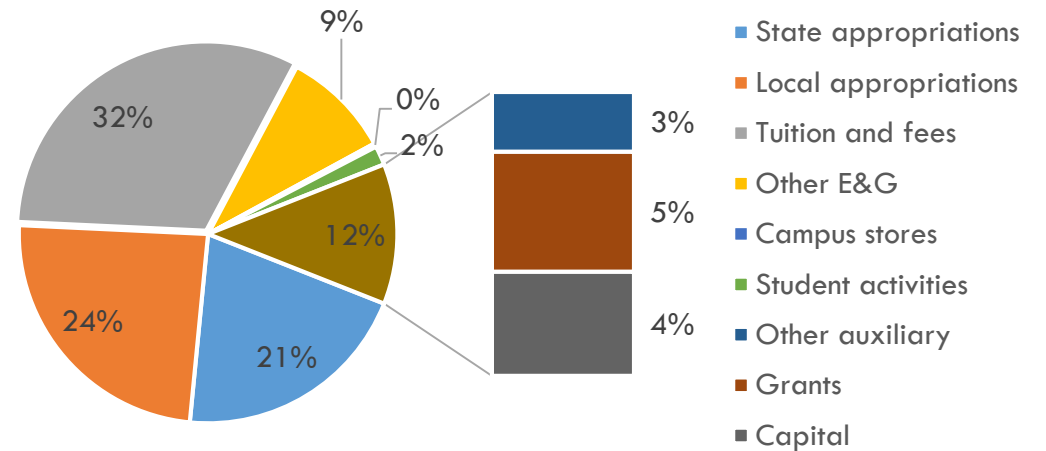

YTD Revenues by Type

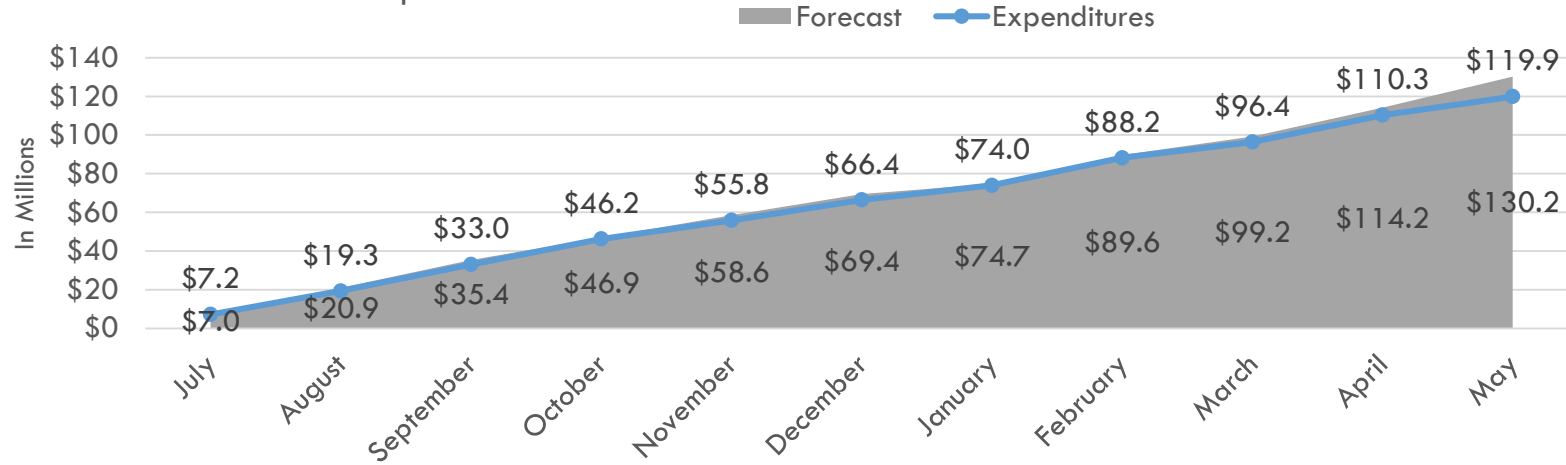


YTD Forecasted Revenues by Type

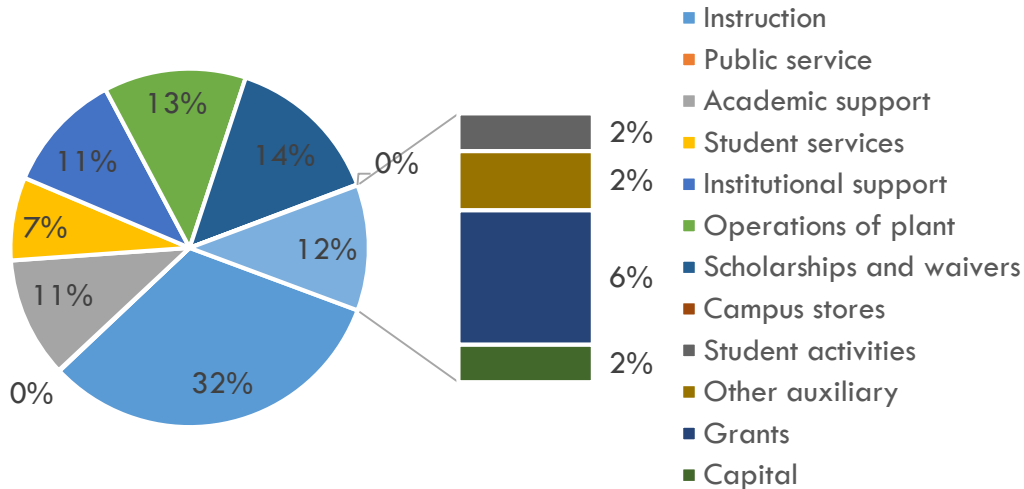

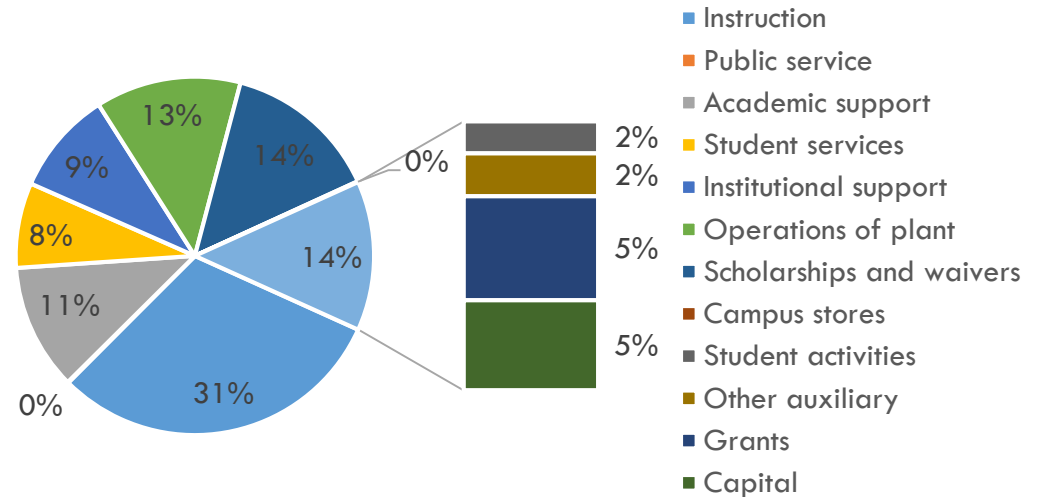

YTD Expenditures by Function

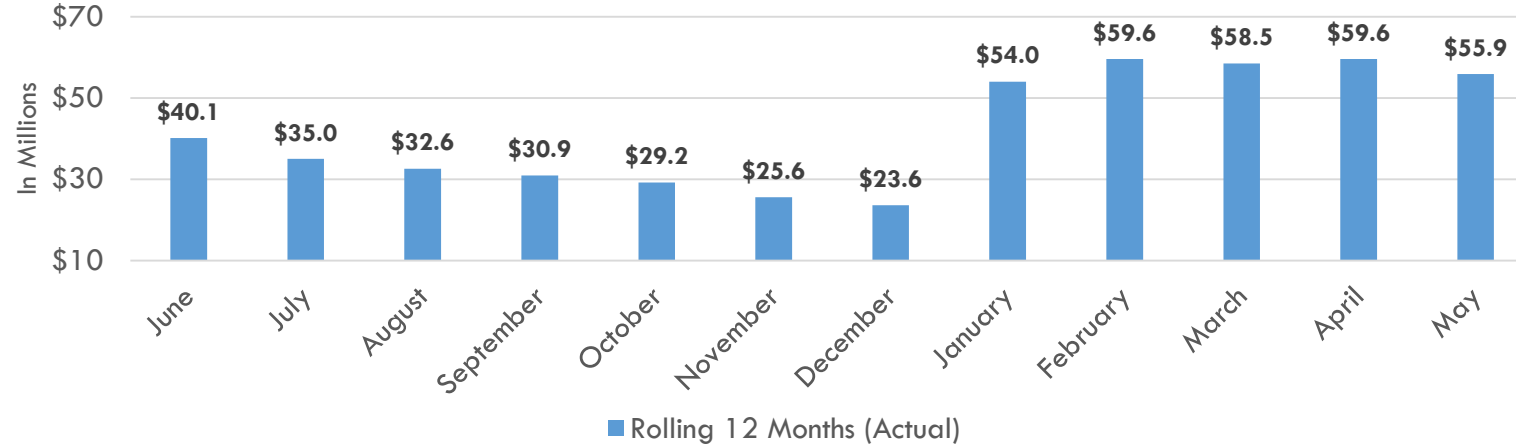


YTD Forecasted Expenditures by Function

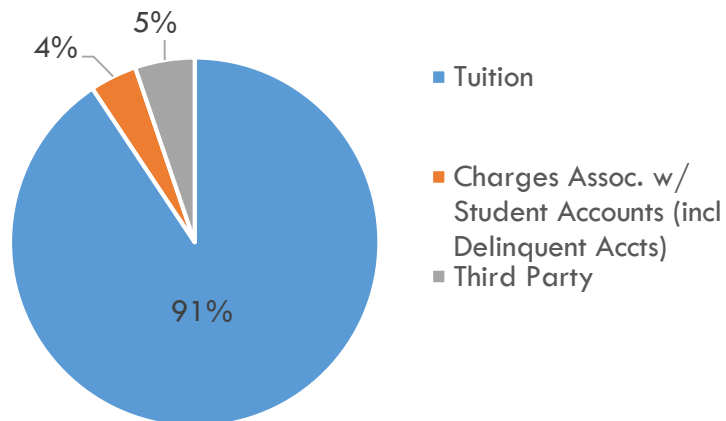

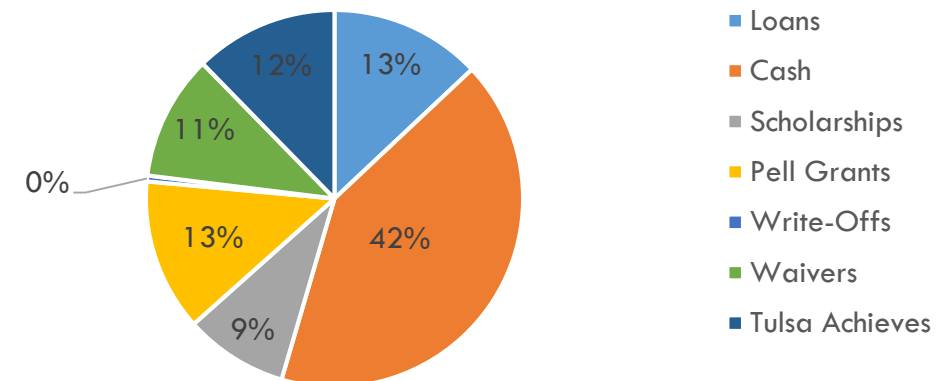

Spring 2021 Student Charges by Type

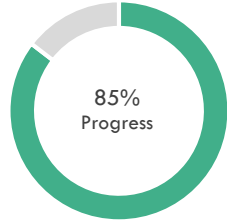


Spring 2021 Payments by Type
