### 2. Student Success Update

Introduction by Dr. Debbie Deibert, Professor and Program Coordinator, Child Development and Education, and presented by TCC student, Ismary Martinez

Dr. Deibert gave an introduction. The Child Development Associate (CDA) is a national credential administered through the Council for Professional Recognition in Washington, D.C. TCC helps the student complete the program through internships, observation, development of a portfolio, and testing.

Dr. Angelica Reina helped develop the bilingual program and introduced Ismary Martinez to the Board.

Ms. Martinez spoke about her journey in the Child Development Associate (CDA) program. Ismary was in the first cohort of bilingual CDA students. She graduated with her CDA in December 2018. She has since then completed her Certificate of Mastery and will graduate with two associate degrees in December. In January, she will begin as an adjunct instructor in the CDA program teaching new bilingual students in the same program where she began her journey.

### **FACILITIES & SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT**

Presented by Regent Beavers and Michael Siftar, Associate Vice President of Administration and Chief Technology Officer

### 1. Overview of Committee Meeting Topics

Regent Beavers asked Mr. Siftar to apprise the board of meeting topics discussed at the December committee meeting.

• Long-term Facilities Planning Update

The Committee received a report regarding the funding strategy for the Metro Campus redevelopment. Interviews for Owner's Representative services are currently underway with a selection recommendation expected in January.

### • Construction Manager RFQ Results Update

Three construction companies have been selected to be on-call for projects ranging up to \$5,000,000 over the next three years. This RFP process yielded eleven proposals with six firms selected for interviews. The three firms chosen ranked highest based on predefined scoring criteria completed by the TCC interview committee.

### • Major Projects Update

Metro Campus construction for Nursing & Health Sciences remains on track with different areas of the campus being ready for student use at the start of the Spring semester.

The Northeast Campus Chemistry Lab remodel has been completed and is available for use.

Supplies for the NEC hydronic piping project are expected to arrive in the next several weeks with permanent installation expected to start over the winter break. The current temporary solution for hot water distribution is working well in the meantime.

Roof repairs at SEC Building 2 are scheduled to start next week.

In conjunction with Marketing, the Facilities department has created a brochure of completed, in progress, and future Deferred Maintenance projects by campus which is included in your board package. This brochure is intended to help highlight recent successes and upcoming priorities.

## 2. Recommendation for Approval to Enter into Agreements for Construction Services

2.1 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to <u>CSS</u>, <u>Inc.</u> (<u>Inola, OK</u>), with a bid of \$1,652,700 for replacement of five air handler units at the Metro Campus Philips Building, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$1,817,970, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders

- within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25004-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.2 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to Forrest Shoemaker Air Conditioning, Inc. (Tulsa, OK), with a bid of \$335,166 for replacement of rooftop units at the Southeast Campus, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$385,441, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25009-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.3 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to <a href="Streamlined Roofing and Construction">Streamlined Roofing and Construction</a> (Norman, OK), with a bid of \$297,158 for ceiling and interior lighting improvements at the Northeast and Southeast Campuses, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$341,732, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25006-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.4 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to <u>Platinum Mechanical</u>, <u>LLC (Tulsa, OK)</u>, with a bid of \$286,725 for replacement of an air handler unit at the West Campus, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$329,734, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25011-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.5 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to Forrest Shoemaker Air Conditioning, Inc. (Tulsa, OK), with a bid of \$283,795 for replacement of an energy recovery unit at the West Campus, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$326,365, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25010-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.6 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to <u>BridgePoint (Tulsa, OK)</u>, in the amount of \$185,493 for electrical work at the Northeast and Southeast Campuses, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$213,317, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and

- project budget limitations. Electrical Trade Services were previously bid under RFP-20011 and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.7 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to <a href="Vale Painting (Tulsa, OK)">Vale Painting (Tulsa, OK)</a>, sole bidder, with a bid of \$140,000 for interior painting at the Southeast Campus PACE Auditorium, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$161,000, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25012-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.8 Ratification was requested to 1) award an agreement to <a href="Harness Roofing.">Harness Roofing.</a> (Harrison, AR), sole bidder, with a bid of \$110,564 for repairs of the Southeast Campus Building 2 roof, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$127,149, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25002-BC and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.9 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to Forrest Shoemaker Air Conditioning, Inc. (Tulsa, OK), with a bid of \$90,263 for replacement of an exhaust fan at the Metro Campus, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$103,803, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25005-AR and will be funded from capital budget.
- 2.10 The Facilities & Safety Committee recommended that the Board of Regents 1) award an agreement to Interior Concepts (Tulsa, OK), with a bid of \$87,800 to provide and install LVT flooring in Building 8 at the Southeast Campus, 2) approve an estimated total project budget of \$100,970, and 3) authorize administration to enter into an agreement and necessary change orders within statutory and project budget limitations. The project was competitively bid under RFP-25007-AR and will be funded from capital budget.

The Finance, Risk and Audit Committee reviewed the agreements at their December committee meeting.

### • <u>Legislative Updates</u>

### Federal

- Expecting new rules and regulations from the new administration and republican congress.
- Linda McMahon was selected as Secretary of the Department of Education and will stand before the senate for approval.
- Congressman Tom Cole is the Chair of Appropriations
- Congressman Kevin Hern is Chairman of the Republican Policy Committee, which helps guide the legislative agenda in the House of Representatives.
- Senator Lankford is Vice Chair of the Senate Republican Conference.

### State

- The makeup of the Oklahoma Legislature did not change after the November election.
- Sean Burrage began serving as Chancellor of Higher Education.
- The State Regents released their legislative agenda and budget request.

### • TCC President's Circle Update

The Foundation is actively recruiting members for the President's Circle. Memberships start at \$1,000 for individuals or couples, or \$2,500 for corporations.

### • TCC Impact Newsletter Update

The official TCC newsletter, TCC Impact, launched in October. The newsletter was distributed to more than 6,000 recipients and resulted in a 55.3% open rate. The newsletter will be sent every other month.

### 1. Purchase Item Agreements over \$50,000

### 1.1 Classroom Equipment

Authorization was requested to enter an agreement with <u>Laerdal Medical Corporation (Wappingers Falls, NY)</u> in the amount of \$556,842 to purchase classroom equipment. This is a manufacturer-direct purchase that is being awarded under First Choice Cooperative contract FC2252 and will be funded from the ARPA budget.

### 1.2 <u>Data Processing Equipment</u>

Authorization was requested to enter an agreement with <u>Pinnacle Business Systems (Edmond, OK)</u> in the amount of \$239,840 to provide data processing equipment. The purchase will be awarded under OMNIA Partners/NCPA contract 01-169 and will be funded from general budget.

### 1.3 Professional Services

Authorization was requested to enter an agreement with <u>Cyntergy AEC LLC</u> (<u>Tulsa</u>, <u>OK</u>) in the amount of **\$64,700** for architectural and engineering services. The services will be funded from general budget

- Remaining HEERF projects nearing completion.

Michael Siftar informed the Board that a rupture of an underground hot water line occurred at Southeast Campus this week and it affects buildings 6 and 8. Multiple plumbers assessed the damage and repair work began. Repairing the damage is vital and timely. Today, repairs are estimated to cost around \$100,000, but they could exceed that amount. College is requesting approval for up to \$150,000 for repairs on an emergency basis. Shoemaker Mechanical, a current vendor, will make the repairs.

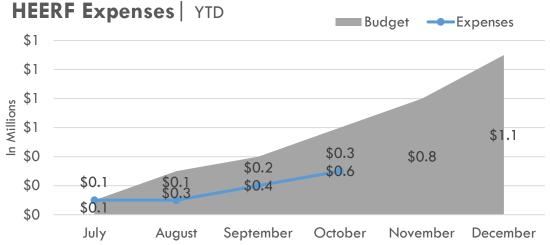


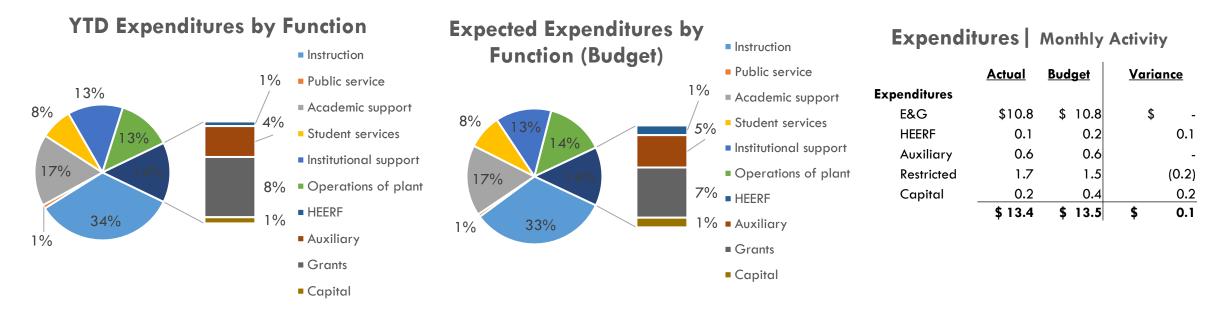
# **Expected Revenues by Type (Budget)**
